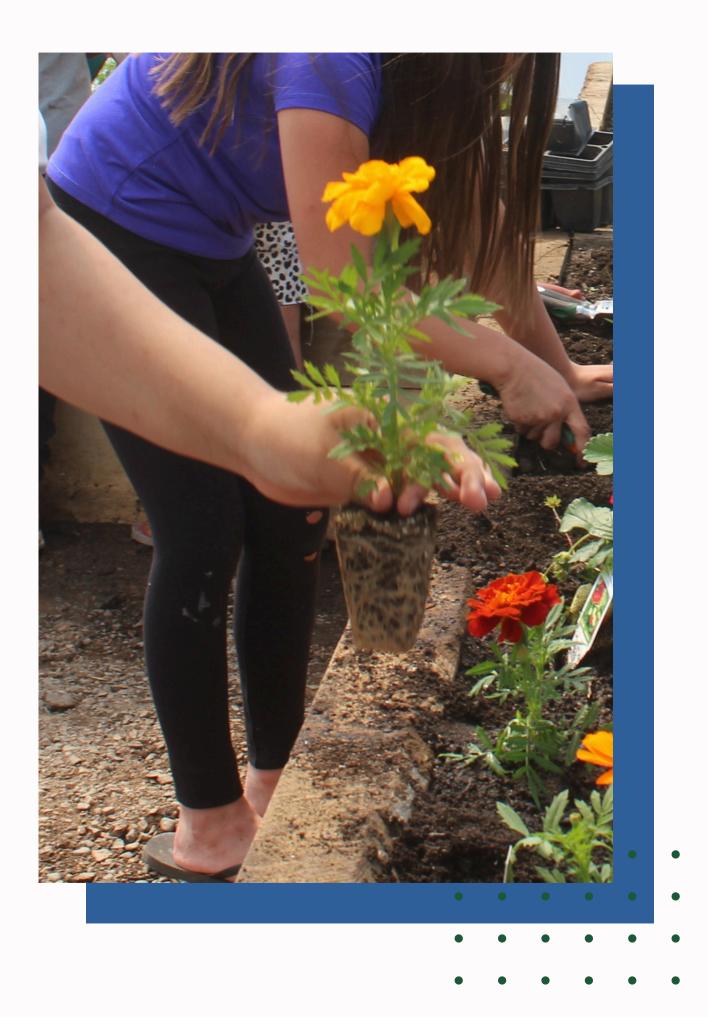
# DIRECTORS' REPORT

Our Story begins over 30 years ago, with a handful of people who recognized that some families in the community were struggling, and the supports they needed were not locally available.

Working together, the College of New Caledonia, School District 91, First Nations and community members began to identify important issues and concerns.

Over the next several years, the society acquired funding to help create the Early Intervention Services program, FASD training and support, and The Link Food Centre

Today, we continue our commitment that began over thirty years ago: to nourish family and community. We do this in an interconnected hub of services called The Link.

Respectful, dignified and inclusive services that focus on improving the quality of life for all members of our communities.

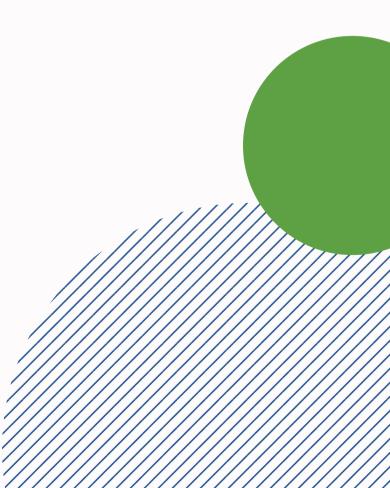

# Community Childcare

29 children served this year

We have 8 licensed Infant/Toddler spots,

16 operational Pre-school spots (licensed for 24)

# SENIORS' SERVICES

### **Better At Home**

Funded through United Way. Helps seniors with simple non-medical, day-to-day tasks so that they can continue to live independently in their own homes and remain connected to their communities.

Burns Lake & Southside services.

There were 47 clients who were visited over 785 times.

# Food Security & Transportation

There were over 3,700 meals served to clients through our Food Security program as well as Meals on Wheels.

116 rides proveded through the United Way transportation funding



### Seniors' Drop-in

2,080 visits with 35 clients

Burns Lake Seniors' Advisory Group had 5 members

# COMMUNITY CONNECTIONS

# Burns Lake: ended in June of 2023 Southside: minimal hours throughout the year



# FOOD CENTRE

### **Client Services**

1,051 clients (roughly 30% children and 20% seniors) received services.

There were over 2,581 hampers distributed.

### **Food Security**

In addition to food distribution, the Food Centre also rescued food from the land fill, planted and harvested a garden and greenhouse and delivered hot meals.

Received a multi-year grant from NDIT for food security initiatives.

### Community Partnerships

Services were offered on the Southside and in Burns Lake, and through partnerships, Tachet and Granisle.

There were 7 community partners who also received support to tackle food security.

# HEALTHY START

### **Client Services**

30 clients and 44 children received services and attended classes and workshops.

This program is funded through the Canadian Prenatal Nutrition Program.

### **Food Security**

80 lunches were prepared with clients throughout the year



### Community Partnerships

Services were offered on the Southside and in Burns Lake.

The program worked closely with 4 other community partners.

177 children received gifts from this program

68 households were served

The Board of Directors for the Society is a legal entity, and as such is responsible, accountable, and liable for all legal and operational aspects of the Society.


